A ...very...Distant Echo

4 years ago, local artists, **George Clark** - filmmaker - and **Tom Challenger** - composer and musician - were working on a project, '**A Distant Echo**' and came to Colne Valley Male Voice Choir for help with the sound track.

This weekend George's film, with music by Tom and the Choir, finally has its 'world premiere' at the **20th Jihlava International Film Festival** in the Czech Republic.



"It's been a long time in gestation." George told VotV.

"I did a lot of the filming in **Death Valley**, California early on. And then the recording session with Tom, Thom and the Choir back in July 2103 gave the project a big boost.

The following year saw the preliminary screening of some footage and a live reading of the script in the historic **Leeds Library** with several Choir members performing, Colne Valley voices included: **Stuart Baxter, John Clark, Brian Hibbert, Michael Parkinson, John Smith** and **Ivan Smith**. And Tom played in first edits of the recorded soundtrack alongside the film footage. I thought then that I wasn't far off finishing the work.

But other jobs kept cropping up, stopping me from finding a concentrated block of time to put all the pieces together as I wanted in a final version."

Since that recording session, George took on a full-time role with Tate Modern as Assistant Curator (film) but, after a couple of years found the pull of independence too great and went back to free-lance working. He's worked in Taiwan, the Philippines, Australia and Croatia – as well as in the UK - and currently he has his base in New Zealand.

"I'm excited about the premiere," says George, "And very pleased with Tom Challenger's realisation of the sound track. We are both Colne Valley lads and working with Thom and CVMVC was a good experience for both of us."



A key element of Tom and George's social life, when they were growing up, was in the **Colne Valley Music Centre**'s various bands: two out the thousands who have reason to be grateful for **Kirklees Music School**.



A Distant Echo is a new film by George Clark that explores themes of identity, culture and the construction of history. Shot on 35mm film in Californian deserts used for Hollywood biblical epics, the project draws together film history, Egyptian culture and the tradition of Yorkshire male voice choirs.


