John tells VotV, "I was delighted when Jenny gave me my cheque although initially I was in a bit of a daze. I am very grateful and plan to share it with my family."



John adds, "I was brought up in Cliffe Ash at the fish & chip shop, now part of the Colne Valley Museum. The Museum café was once our living room. Singing has always been part of my life. I joined the church choir at Golcar as a soprano when I was about eight and carried on years later as a bass, singing the anthem most Sundays.

We occasionally helped out in the choir at Westwood and it was there that I met my wife, Marlene, who lived at Bolster Moor, where we eventually bought a house and where we still live today. I had been an apprentice at the Yorkshire Electricity Board and I stayed there all my working life.

It was close on 50 years ago, when I joined CVMVC. It was in 1969, the year after **George Stead** died, so I never sang under him but I did sing with him once, when he came to help out in the choir at Westwood.

I have met some wonderful people in the Choir and made numerous friendships."

It's a great scheme - the 200 Club

It's one of the means by which the Choir's subs are kept so low. Friends and members buy a number for £50 a year and that gets you a chance in the weekly draw to win £45, or once a month £185 and best of all, twice a year, a huge £1,000 prize. Fully half of the money that comes in is paid out again as prizes – 'Eat your heart out, Lottery' our odds are much better. And, of course, if you don't win, you have the satisfaction of knowing that the cash that stays in the fund goes to underwrite the operating costs of a great choir – so it's a win-win scenario.

Give as you live

Another fund raising scheme to note is the 'Give as you Live' plan.

A Choir-Member told VotV he recently booked his holiday with **Saga Online**, he bought some exercise equipment from **Sports Direct** and some medicaments from **Amazon**.



But he went to each of these websites via **Give as you Live**. That's the business that recognises **Colne Valley Male Voice Choir** as one of its charitable causes for cash back.

Later he got an email from **Give as you Live**, telling him **his recent purchases had raised £44.43 for the Choir.**

"It really does work and it's easy. You just register as a supporter of CVMVC. You get routed through their website to the usual ones you want to deal with. It doesn't cost you a penny more but the Choir gets a few quid. It's got to be good!"

The Coventry Carol

The **Coventry Carol** will figure in our repertoire for this year's Christmas Concerts.

As a Choir, we haven't sung it for 18 years but there will be many members who will relish its return and our audiences will, we hope, respond to its harmonies.



The **Coventry Carol**" is English and dates, probably from the 16th century. It was traditionally performed in Coventry as part of a 'mystery play called, 'The pageant of the Shearmen and Tailors'.

The play depicts the tragic episode in the Christmas story from the Gospel of Saint Matthew in which King Herod orders that all male infants under the age of two in Bethlehem be killed - the so-called **'Massacre of the Innocents'** - in a vain attempt to ensure that no potential rival to his kingdom survives. This is how Pieter Breughel imagined it in 1567.

The carol takes the form of a lullaby, sung by the mothers of the doomed children. (In the 15th century, the mothers would have been voiced by male singers.)

Within the pageant, the carol is sung by three women of Bethlehem, who enter on stage with their children immediately after Joseph is warned by an angel to take his family to Egypt.

The music contains a well-known example of a **Picardy Third**. A **Picardy Third**, refers to the 'resolution' into a major chord which typically comes at the end of a musical section, which is in a minor key. This is achieved by raising the third of the expected minor triad by a semitone to create a major triad.

According to one musicologist, "Western composers, expressing the 'rightness' of happiness by means of a major third, expressed the 'wrongness' of grief by means of the minor third, and for centuries, pieces in a minor key had to have a 'happy ending' – a final major chord (the 'tierce de Picardie' or Picardy Third). The grief of the mothers of the innocents, expressed in the minor key, yields eventually to the final 'major chord', indicating, perhaps, that there may be hope beyond the cruelty."

International art-film-maker, George Clark, corralled CVMVC into helping create the sound-track of his movie 'A Distant Echo' some time in 2013.



And who better than CVMVC - the bastions of Yorkshire culture - to provide the background soundtrack. That's why I - and fellow Marsdener and Jazz-man, Tom Challenger - were really pleased that the Choir was willing to help recording the specially-composed film music. In addition, half a dozen Choir members came forward to voice the dialogue in their own inimitable 'Yorkshire' style.



Now at last the film is to have its Yorkshire Premiere as part of the Leeds Film Festival. The film has been shown to date in many locations, including:-


It'll be great!
