

# A Great Night at the Town Hall

Colne Valley Male Voice Choir hosted their 'Christmas Festival' again tonight at Huddersfield's Town Hall - and what a terrific event it turned out to be - nearly a thousand ventured out in the snow and enjoyed a performance well up to the to the high standard the Choir has set in its Christmas concerts for close on half a century.

Tonight, the Choir, our main guests, Colne Valley Boys and Brighouse and Rastrick Band were all on stage to start off the evening's performance; the haunting boy-soprano voice leading 'Who is he .... in yonder stall' and the Choir coming in with gentle harmonies and finally the band to create a small but dramatic climax before the melody faded to a close. It sounded great in the beautifully decorated Town Hall and it was the cue for both audience and performers alike to realise that there was a glorious concert ahead for us all.



I said we started off with the boy soprano - and so we did - but, in practice, the evening's musical ball had been set rolling sometime earlier - with the fine entertainment provided by **Caius Lee**, at the Father Willis organ. Cauis is Assistant Organist to the Diocese of Leeds and a very talented young man

The audience's got its chance to sing soon after: one of Huddersfield's favourite carols, 'Christians Awake'. Readers might like to know that the words to this carol were by a chap called **John Byrom**. Byrom was born in the 'Old Shambles' in Manchester in 1692 and claimed he penned verses 'only for recreation'. Indeed he was famous in his lifetime for many other things - not least for his extreme height. He was, apparently 'one of the tallest men in the Kingdom'.





Then came the first solo items by the **Brighouse and Rastrick Brass Band**. We've always known they are one of the finest band's there is - anywhere - but this year they are on a special high, having recently won the N°1 spot in the Great Britain National Finals. Under the baton of Guest Conductor, **Lee Skipsey**, they were marvellous

as always, showing tremendous musicianship ensemble and as individual players - not least amongst them, **Mike Eccles** who played the flugelhorn solo in their beautiful rendition of 'Away in a Manger'.



One of the finest pieces by the Choir was a new anthem by **Craig Courtney**, 'One Faith, One Hope, One Lord', which had been purchased for the Choir by John & Enid Radcliffe, to mark John's 60 years as a baritone with his Colne Valley colleagues.





This first performance was accompanied by a cornet solo from **Kathleen Gaspoz**.

Kathleen has just picked up the trophy as 'Best Instrumentalist' at the same competition that saw B&R crowned Britain's N°1 brass band.

The bulk of the accompaniment, though, came, as always, from that Maestro of the Keyboard, **Keith Swallow**, playing for the Choir for the 49<sup>th</sup> consecutive time in this annual highlight of the Choir's year. Where would the Choir be without him? He made the middle bars in the sentimental John Rutter ballad, '**The Very Best Time of Year**' extra luscious.





Our very own Colne Valley Boys get better every year and we were pleased to have them on stage with us for all the first half. With that very skilled musician and - very welcome stand-in conductor of the men -Christopher Pulleyn, at the keyboard, the Boys gave us great pleasure, not least in their version of the that favourite, Irving Berlin's 'White Christmas.'





Everyone was involved in the first half 'show stopper' 'We Rise Again' This fine and rousing song begins with second-tenor James Cooke singing a solo verse then gradually Boys, Choir and Band join in to create a wall of sound, jubilant in the apparent power of re-incarnation in that our children and our song live on after us. 'We rise again in the faces of our children. We

rise again in the voices of our song.'

It was rather sad that the Choir's Patron, Patricia, Countess of Harewood, was not able to attend this year. She is quite elderly now and, we gather, would have found the trip to Huddersfield a little wearing. The Choir thanks her for her ongoing support and wishes her well for Christmas and the New Year. We were, however, pleased to see new sponsors in the Duckett family of Holmfirth Dyers Limited and to receive the ongoing support of our advertisers and of our printers, Brook and Learoyd.



Others might claim it was their beautifully sympathetic brass band version of a piece the Choir has sung on many occasions; **Morten Lauridsen's** '**O Magnum Mysterium**'.



To please the traditionalists, the Choir sang Sir Arthur Sullivan's 'Lost Chord', accompanied at the organ by our wonderful compère, Dr Simon Lindley. It was magnificent.

And, of course the boys are the stars but great credit goes to **Matt** and **Linda Houston** for getting the show off the ground.






### Joe wants some more new singers for 2108

### This man in Liverpool Echo


