

Psalm 126 video rediscovered

A video of the CVMVC singing **Psalm 126**, believed long-lost, has turned up.

Second Tenor, **Joe Stones**, told Voice of the Valley that, years ago, he liked the video so much, when he saw it on the old Choir website, that he made a copy of it.





And recently it turned up again. He was happy to make a copy available, which VotV has slightly re-edited, and is happy to present it to members and friends of the Choir.

David Hirst tells VotV, "It was on the 12th December 2004 that the filming of our performance for the Choir's new website took place. It was at the Town Hall Christmas Concert, when the guest Band was the **Grimethorpe Colliery Band**, conducted that evening by **Richard Evans**. The compère, who isn't shown, was Borough Organist, **Gordon Stewart**.

The concert video is intercut with shots of rehearsals upstairs in the Slaithwaite Conservative Club and scenes of social activity in the bar below. The filming and editing was professionally done by a firm called '**Leagus**'. They had been commissioned by the Choir to set up and administer the Choir's first website, which was launched in early 2005."



He adds the following extra information: "Psalm 126 was composed in 1964 by the then conductor of CVMVC, **George E Stead**, especially in order to be able to be used as the Choir's own choice test-piece at the July 1964 **Llangollen International Eisteddfod** alongside the MVC Class set test-pieces of Adoramus Te (Palestrina) and Matona My Beloved (Orlando di Lasso).



The Choir was placed second to a male choir from Pisa, Italy - **Societa Corale Pisana** with marks of 88, 88, 91 (Psalm 126) as against the Italian Choir's marks of 90, 89, 91 (their own choice item).

The prize monies were 1st Place £100, 2nd Place £50, 3rd Place £25. That looks 'small fry today but £50, fifty years ago, would be worth about £850 today. However, it's still small compared to the First Prize money we won at the 1966 inaugural Tees-side Industrial International Eisteddfod held in Middlesborough - £500 - which is equivalent to about £8,500 at current prices."

He concludes, "I was able spend time turning up all this information, as I was at home all day sheltering from the snowy, wet weather."

'Time well-spent, David.' says VotV.

The last words of David

As one of our competition pieces for the 'Mrs Sunderland', we are re-learning, under Thom's tutelage, this wonderful piece. It's a masterful work for demonstrationg the range of choral skills that a choir needs to demonstate in competition.

This version is by the **Baylor Men's University Choir**, which has been singing in Waco, Texas, for almost as long as we have here in Slaithwaite. It's not at all bad - maybe a tad too fast for my taste. If you want a really wonderful version, CVMVC recorded it on our CD, 'Classic Colne Valley' but, of course, there's no video. Randall Thompson created this dramatic, dynamically-varied and beautifully-harmonised male voice choir composition in 1949.

It has been relearned, every few years, by several different generations of Colne Valley singers as the years go by.

One of his students, incidentally was Leonard Bernstein, who went on to a very distinguished musical career, including writing the music for 'West Side Story'.

Joshua fit the Battle of Jericho

Our other piece for the 'Mrs Sunderland' competition is 'Joshua fit the battle of Jericho' – but our version is rather special.

It's a terrific arrangement by John Rutter of this old gospel number one of a suite of seven – but John Rutter only wrote them for mixed voices.

Colne Valley's Music Director, **Thom Meredith** got in touch with John
Rutter and sought permission to
transcribe the work for a male voice
choir - specifically for CVMVC.
Unsurprisingly, Thom's transcription
met with John Rutters approval and
so it's now part of the Colne Valley
repertoire.

As far as I can tell, there's no male voice performance on the internet and CVMVC has never recorded it.

Our version is terrific - perhaps we should!

The version below is one of the best the Editor came across. It is by an ensemble of men and women from **Citrus College**, California. Based in Glendora - a suburb of Los Angeles - its 19,000 strong student body includes a highly-regarded Performing Arts Faculty.
