
As for **Les and Joan** - they are very much still in business and going strong after 60 years of togetherness.

A former singer, Harold Clough died, peacefully, at home, on the last day of February.

Harold had many friends in the Choir who were very much saddened by the news, announced last rehearsal by Secretary, **Jenny Baxter**. And indeed, many other readers of Voice of the Valley and many more, all across the district will be equally saddened to hear that a lovely man has passed away. The Choir sang the 'four-fold Amen' in his memory.



Harold was one of the stalwarts of Blackley Baptist Church near Elland, so it is natural that his funeral will take place there on Friday **March 23rd**. The Choir will be singing again in his honour.



The Church recently celebrated its 225th Anniversary. Harold, with the memory of his dear wife, Betty, also in mind, organised 'A Bit of a Do' there in 2014. At this special concert, Harold presented the church with a new piano and got keyboard maestro, Keith Swallow, in to

play it - just one of those who were happy to turn up and perform at his request; Harry and Ellie (**The Switch**), **Christopher Pulleyn** and **Thom Meredith** included. (Use this link for Keith's **Schubert Impromtu**.


Harold joined Colne Valley Male Voice Choir in 1961. During almost 57 years with CVMC, he was a faithful member of the First Tenor section, until his failing health meant that he went on the 'inactive list' for the last few years. But he remained a 'Life Member' and a regular visitor to rehearsals and concerts until fairly recently and always took an enthusiastic and jovial interest in what the Choir was up to.

Musically and socially, Harold was a well-loved and respected member of the Choir and those of us who were lucky enough to know him have happy memories of his time with us.

His life in music began before CVMVC: for example, he also sang in a quartet called Concorde with former member, **Norman Dearnley**, Roy Firth, Muriel McKean, and Freda Jessop. The pianist was Harold's sister, also Muriel. In 1956 the quartet won the **Mrs Sunderland** competition and the same year Harold won the '**Operatic Singer**' and also '**Tenor Singer**' contests.



He was awarded the Drake Rose Bowl as "Singer of the Competition'. Harold is also an **Honorary Life Member** of the **Huddersfield Choral Society**, which he joined as far back as 1947.



Perhaps he would have said that the highlights of his time with the Choir would have been twice winning the Eisteddfod at Llangollen, travelling & singing in Germany, Czechoslovakia and, in 1984, on a Choir tour to California.

Lynn Hudson (Mrs Thom Meredith) is well regarded by Choir members as a perceptive and highly skilled Choir conductor.



Kilner Bank

First Tenor, **John Kilner**, asked the VotV Editor, the other night, whether I knew where the name **Kilner Bank** comes from. Maybe it's the fund John uses to buy his **200 Club** numbers, was my first idea. But it set me thinking a bit more....

This unusual and interesting **name** is a variant form of the English occupational surname "**Kilner**". Originally the word referred to either a potter or one who was in charge of a Kiln.



Kilner Bank runs just a stone's throw from the centre of Huddersfield, alongside the River Calder for about a mile or so. As well as being the name of the area and the hillside, it is also the name of a road which runs the length of it. **Huddersfield Town** built a new stadium there, the 'John Smith' (no relation to our

second-tenor) just across the river and they called one stand, the Kilner End.

Two theories emerge:

1 That the area was named after a site where kilns were operated, probably using the timber that still characterises the forest site – the area is now partly a 'nature reserve'.

2 That **Kilner Bank** is named after a family called Kilner.

Perhaps the most famous Kilner family with connections to Kirklees is the one that invented the 'Kilner Jar – the glass jar, either screwtop or with the rubber seal that is clamped tight with a metal fastener and is used for preserving fruit and pickles.

John Kilner, he of the jars, was born in 1782 and was an employee in a glass factory. He set up a glassworks with friends and through thrift and skill turned the business into a massive success. Industrialisation and growing prosperity increased the demand for the production of glasses, jars and bottles and soon John possessed

two factories in Yorkshire. He died in 1857 and the firm was taken over by his four sons, George, (famous naughty boy, **Jeremy Clarkson**'s great-great-grandfather) William, John and Caleb. Each learned their trade on the factory floor and the firm, then known as '**Kilner Brothers**', continues to thrive.
