"I sung with **Linthwaite Church** choir, boy then man, singing treble then later tenor. But Saturday nights, 'on the Town' became more enticing than Sunday morning services. So I gradually let the choir slip.

While going to dances etc in Town I met my present wife, **Audrey**, and we have just passed our 56th year of marriage.

She has over the years put up with me playing rugby and working on contracts overseas; that is me not being around as much as I wanted to help to raise our family of three.

When I approached 40, there was no more rugby or working abroad. I became a senior manager responsible for up to 300 electricians and apprentices until the directors sold out to East Midlands Electricity. Over the following year I started my own company, along with a former apprentice. We dealt mainly with bespoke automated electrical control systems.

At 63, I dissolved my partnership, bought two properties in Andalusia, southern Spain, and 'retired' to the villa in the hills. Until in 2015 we moved back to our house in **Almondbury**. Now instead of living in a sunshine country, we now have lots of holidays in the sun. What could be better?



On our last cruise we sailed to the Canaries, and I joined the 'on-board choir'. This was made up of holiday makers and musically directed by two of the entertainment team.

I thoroughly enjoyed the practices, singing again after close on 60 years, and the public concert performed on the penultimate day was a sell-out (free and a captive audience, of course)

I had got the taste.

On our return I spoke to **Brian Hearne**, as I knew he sang with the Colne Valley, and on Monday October 7th I attended my first choir practice; just 2 days after my return from the cruise.

I made my first appearance in my 'best bib and tucker' with the second tenors at the Town Hall Concert in December.

So here I am, loving it."

Geoff tells VotV how his holiday turned out to be quite different to what he expected

"We had pondered on whether we should go ahead with our holiday, having read and listened to all the terrible reports coming in from China.

So we went!



Thursday 12th March we flew from Manchester Airport with Jet2 to the Hotel Gloria Palace, Amadores, **Gran Canaria**.

Friday and Saturday were_pretty much as one would expect for a holiday; after breakfast a short walk, then find a sun lounger, a little sunbathing, then back to the room for a rest, then get ready for evening dinner.

But as we slept, a A4 sheet was pushed under the bedroom door:- an official notification that the **Spanish Government** had passed a Royal Decree 'As a preventive measure, you must remain inside the Hotel establishment. No access to the public roads, unless you need to go to the nearest supermarket, or the farmacia'

LOCKDOWN

On the TV we heard that a number of planes had been turned around in mid flight, and all JET2 (and others) had now ceased all flights to many areas including Gran Canaria.

By Monday, the amenities of the hotel were closed; the pools and the loungers were out of bounds, too, the entertainment cancelled etc. The cliff edge walks were devoid of people, the water taxis to Port Mogan etc. had ceased, and the sea was now empty.

The area for the pool snack bar was now our only place to sit out, unless your balcony was sunny. The hotel changed the layout of the dining tables too to make sure we are at least 2 metres away from the next diners.



There was no angst from the guests. Everybody calmly selected a table and chairs, ordered a drink, through the waiter as we were not allowed to queue at the counter; this was sectioned off with standard red and white plastic tape.



We all went to see the JET2 rep. Again, no queues, no angst, no angry holiday makers. She confirmed the halting of JET2 flights after the 21st.


Ours was for the 22nd. Now what?

The flight was one of JET2's emergency repatriation flights, which had flown out to Gran Canaria empty.


The flight was uneventful and early. We tumbled into bed around midnight. Woke up at home on Thursday morning to our present nightmare! And no Choir either!" Geoff

Some of Geoff's happy memories



Back in the 60's, visits to Llangollen made for a very long day, no motorways and the coaches were not as powerful. On the way through we used to stop at Chester for a coffee break, and after the competition we would return to Chester for an evening meal. This was followed by entertainment which always included George Stead's inimitable rendering of "Simon the Cellarer". We would get back to the Colne Valley at about 2.30 in the morning.

Male Voice classes at Llangollen in those days were restricted to 60 voices. I was a reserve in 1961 but I made the team in 1962 onwards.

The visit to Solingen in 1965 was memorable. The choir was split into two equal halves under the control of the conductor and the deputy conductor. We flew out in two separate aircraft and met up in the main square. If memory serves, Keith Swallow drove over in his sports car.

Between 1990 and 2020, after I had returned, there were contests at Llangollen, Newcastle, Northern Male Voice Championship and of course the 'Mrs Sunderland'.

We hosted the mixed choir from Jablonec in Czechoslovakia, the two choirs had a very good concert at St. Pauls. The Czechs stayed with Choir members, Sue and I were lucky enough to look after two young ladies! The following year, 1992, we visited Czechoslovakia - a totally different experience. We sang in Prague Cathedral, and on the way home in Cologne Cathedral.



A trip to France was very enjoyable, it took forever to get to the Channel Tunnel, we sang in Rouen and Chartres Cathedrals.

1994 and 1997 saw us take part in the 1000 Yorkshire Male Voices at the Royal Albert Hall, to raise funds for Yorkshire Cancer Research. That was a wonderful experience

New member, Matthew Dennis, talks to Voice of the Valley....

"I don't really have a formal musical background but my background is roughly as follows:

I'm originally from Barnsley in South Yorkshire, but spent most of my adult life in Manchester, studying to become an ecologist then working as a lab technician and more recently a lecturer in Geography at the University of Manchester where I teach and carry out research on landscape ecology.

I lived in South Manchester with my young family until the end of 2017. Then I felt it was time to head back to God's Own County and the Colne Valley was just an obvious choice – drawn to the landscape, particularly the moors, as well as the heritage of the place, particularly the music. Clearly a big part of that is the Colne Valley Male Voice Choir and it feels good to be officially one of the 'Voices of the valley'.

I've always enjoyed singing in groups of one sort or another but, since moving back across the Pennines, I've been reduced to singing around the house. My wife is glad I now have an 'outlet'.

I'm not sure what else to add in terms of how I found the Choir - I knew as soon as I heard of it that I'd have to give it a go. **First came late last year and it just felt like home.** Took my test early in March and now I'm one of the baritones. Thanks everybody and all the best."

Matthew sent this on 12th March - just 3 days later the Choir announced its virus shutdown. Stick around, Matthew, you are very welcome. And we'll be back!

Mrs Sunderland - a great day of music-making

It seems such a long time ago already. So much has been going on. But Colne Valley Male Voice Choir had a terrific day of singing at the end of February at the **Mrs Sunderland Music Festival**.



'Personally', writes VotV Editor, John Clark, 'I might have been demoralised that we didn't win our 51st First Prize, after the two afternoon competitions, had we not been invited to take part in the Gala Concert on the Saturday evening. That meant we got to sing 3 times. Each appearance with different material - 7 songs in all - the widest range of repertoire of any choir in the festival. And we sang them all well - about as well as we could have done.

If the Adjudicator doesn't give better than a second prize - maybe it's just not your day. I did notice that he said, "Enormous choir, enormous sound. Tremendous power but you use it so skilfully. Utterly thrilling. You've put me in a real dilemma over placings."

Later of 'How Great Thou Art! "My god, it nearly knocked me out of my chair, that terrific beginning..."


"This is a wonderful festival." he added. "The fame of Huddersfield as a centre of choral excellence is well-earned. There's some remarkable work going on here. Not to mention, tremendous positivity and goodwill."

Well, we didn't win but I was proud to be a participant.

The honours for the day went to Peterborough Voices; a women's choir that placed first in the Women's Choirs class, Choir Programme class, and the Choir Prizewinners' Challenge, taking the top spot among 12 competing choirs to win the Jessie Jameson Centenary Baton and the Huddersfield Centenary Trophy as the choir singing the 'single best piece' in the festival. Well done Peterborough people.'
