Inventor and developer, **Ken Farr**, still sings first tenor and still entertains his fellow Choir members.


He might be an 88 year old veteran but he retains an interest in developing mathematical ideas.

Ken writes:-

My visit to **Abergavanny Boxes** in July this year was to explore the potential for different and improved potato handling and storage.

It was a great business trip but also turned out to be quite a nostalgic one. You see, heading back to the station from the potato fields I couldn't help noticing a sign for **Merthyr Tydfil**. That was the town of my birth, way back in 1933. I stayed in Wales until, in 1960, with my wife, **Pamela**, and two young sons, **Stephen** and **Dean**, I emigrated to New Zealand.



Abergavanny, says Ken, is the home to male voice choir outfit, **Synergy**. Their version of the '**Teddy Bears Picnic'** is well remembered by longer-serving Choir members as a knockout opening piece in a Torquay competition many years ago.

Peter reckons it will be a particularly poignant song to perform, post-Covid, as the choir and audience gives thought to all those we know who have passed away.

He writes:-

"Great to see everybody on Monday night and to sing in the Choir again. I thought you might be interested in a programme aired on BBC Radio 4 the other morning at 9.00am called 'Soul Music', and devoted mostly to the 250 year history of the song, 'The Parting Glass'.

I first came upon it in the folk clubs from the 1960's and sang it myself in a folk group involving former Choir members, **Stuart Iles**, and the late **Tony Ackroyd**.

It's a lovely piece with different emotional messages for many who've sung it, as the programme relates.




This is the second such request we've had for this piece this year. We hope Minister Hann's congregation across the world enjoys it.


