

Keynote Concert confirmed

Perhaps the biggest concert of our Centenary Year is now a firm commitment in our diary.

On October 1st Colne Valley Male Voice Choir will host the Band of the Coldstream Guards at Huddersfield Town Hall.

This great news was made known to VotV by Choir Chairman Joe Stones, "It's been ages in the pipeline and we couldn't speak about it. The military planning process is complex when arranging concerts such as ours but just a couple of days ago I got the go-ahead from the Army. There are loads of arrangements still to make but we can now get cracking to make this event one of the most spectacular of the Choir's 100 years of music and entertainment."



The Coldstream Guards, as most people will know is one of the regiments of the Household Division. We saw them all recently when more than 1,500 soldiers and 350 horses paraded on Horse Guards Parade for the final review of Trooping the Colour by HRH, the Duke of Cambridge. It marked the start of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations.

The Coldstream Guards Band is world famous for its role in military events and for the quality of its musicianship. They wear the 'bearskins' on ceremonial occasions, apparently with a discrete red plume to distinguish them from the other regiments.

How did we entice them to come to Huddersfield as our guests?

Joe points to two main factors. "The Band is very interested in recruitment of top-class young musicians.



We made it known to them that we would be happy to host a recruitment event on the day of the concert.

With our Music Director, **Thom** Meredith we are fortunate to have excellent connections with **'Musica** young players via Kirklees'. With Thom's help, that that means young instrumentalists locally can have the chance to meet and perhaps play alongside the Coldstream Guards Band.

They can find out a little about the potential to develop their musical skills and explore Army Music Career Opportunities.

We also hope that via Thom's excellent contacts with Kirklees and neighbouring local authorities will mean that young people from surrounding areas can also join in.

We're planning to provide free gallery tickets to young people for this event and expect that young players will be an important part of the evening concert programme.

The second thing the band is interested in is 'charity work'. This fits very neatly with CVMVC plans. The concert will make no profits. All surplus funds, after expenses, will go to charitable causes. We expect to make a substantial donation to 'Help for Heroes'. Perhaps more importantly, we expect to underwrite a fund that will give financial support to enable local young musicians to develop their musical skills."

But there may be some other connections that had some influence on the Guards decision to come to Huddersfield. Our Chairman's brother is Colour Sergeant **Nicolas Stones**. Surely that must have helped Joe understand better what the Guards planning concerns might encompass. Maybe similar insights came from our Vice President, **Keith Fielding**'s warm acquaintance with **Lieutenant Colonel Simon Haw MBE**, Commanding Officer of the Household Division Band; the officer who oversees all the state ceremonial music in London for Her Majesty the Queen.



David Hirst also points out that CVMVC had performed with the Coldstream Guards on three previous occasions during our Choir's glorious history, most recently, about 42 years ago, at the Civic Theatre in Halifax. CVMVC's conductor was John Gulley, Keith Swallow accompanied and the Coldstream Guards Band was conducted by Lt. Col. R. A. Ridings.

Two joint items were performed: **The Peers Chorus** from Iolanthe and **The Soldiers' Chorus** from Faust.




"We've only just had our correspondence from the current Director of Music, **Major Stewart Halliday**.

So now the work can really get started at the Colne Valley end. We've got a big series of tasks and not that much time to sort them, but I'm convinced we can make October 1st 2022 a great event in our birthday year and a day to remember."

Geoff's membership dates back to the 1960's when he sang with us during some of our glory years, including our three consecutive victories at the Llangollen Eisteddfod.






Work took him away but he rejoined us in 1990 for a further 30 year spell. He had particularly fond memories of Choir trips to France and Czechoslovakia.
