



A wonderful night at the Town Hall

Bui Doi




This sober and distinguished figure is Warrant Officer Class 2 (Bandmaster) **Simon C Lindley**, who deputised for **Major Stuart Halliday**, conducting the band in several items of our concert repertoire.

He it was, who led the ensemble in the rousing anthem from **Miss Saigon**, '**Bui Doi**'.

This award-winning musical, a kind of redrafting of

Puccini's Madame Butterfly, tells this time of the American soldiers who struck up relationships with Vietnamese women, promised undying love and then left them bereft - and often pregnant - when US troops were withdrawn.



'Bui Doi' refers to the children they left behind and to a final acknowledgement that they need to be loved and accepted in post-war Saigon.

When the song was over, there was a brief silence, followed by wild applause.

Simon looked both overjoyed and a little bemused, "What just happened ?" he asked .

Well what happened was the Choir, the band, two fabulous soloists, Thom and Chris, and the audience had just experienced a moment of magic.

Those who were there will never forget it.

Join the Army - you could do worse

One of the reasons the Choir was able to lure this fabulous band to West Yorkshire was that we were able to offer them a Community Engagement & Recruitment opportunity. We are most fortunate that our Musical Director's day job is as principal of **Musica Kirklees**, the area's prime training body for youth and music.

Under Thom's guidance, dozens of orchestras, wind bands, vocal and percussion groups thrive and hundreds get instrumental tuition. '**Army Music**'s pitch is that they can offer recruits excellent musical training and unrivalled opportunities for performance. Musica Kirklees objective is to enrich the offering to young people to develop their musical potentials - so there was a natural coming together of aspirations.

The result was that, on the day of the concert, there was a marvellous workshop, where local young instrumentalists met with and played alongside some of the best professionals in the country.

Guard, **Flossie**, was one of the team who told the assembled young people, before the workshop about what recruits could expect. Via Army music, they could get their music degrees and instead of racking up huge tuition-fee debt, could instead earn about £9,000 a year whilst training with the Guards. And then move on to a good job with a decent wage and wonderful chances to travel and to perform at major events. It didn't sound half-bad: though, of course, you have to be more prepared to shoot people than you might be in the average conservatoire.



Major Stuart Halliday was one of the Guards who led the workshop. Young players were interspersed with the guards. Very noticeable was how supportive the guards were with the youngsters; enabling and encouraging rather than dominating and not in the least condescending. The ensemble played music from the musical, 'Chigago', and from 'Star Wars' amongst other pieces and did a short concert for parents at the end.




