A good and enthusiastic audience at St James' Church heard the resurgent Slaithwaite Band performing under their Musical Director, **Leigh Baker**.

(CVMVC knows Leigh quite well - he was guest conductor of Brighouse and Rastrick Band at one of our great Town Hall Christmas Concerts.)

And they are a fine band, established in Slaithwaite in 1892 and going strong after 130 years.

Interspersed with the Band's repertoire were performances by the men of the Colne Valley (just 100 years old) and the boys of Colne Valley Boys, both under the direction of **Thom Meredith**, supported by inestimable accompanist, **Chris Pulleyn**.

Let's hope so.


### Basil's glory days

The last edition of Voice of the Valley mentioned the recent death of former second tenor **Basil Hirst**, who passed away aged 96 in Bradford after a long and full life.

Basil had been for many years a prominent member of Colne Valley Male Voice Choir; a good-humoured chap, a very talented singer and musician and always a positive and supportive mentor to newer members (of whom your Editor was one).



Most of us knew that Basil had been a policeman through much of his working life and that he'd been connected with a police choir.



A recent discovery by **Stuart Baxter** throws some more light on this. It turns out that **Superintendent Basil Hirst** had been a singer in the City of Bradford Police Male Voice Choir for many years and that he had taken on the conductor's role in 1970.

That it was a fine choir is evidenced by these two clips from their 1974 long-playing record, 'Farewell to Bradford Police'. This recording was made to mark the end of the choir and the end of Bradford City Police, as the various West Yorkshire police forces were merged into one Metropolitan Police Force.




He says, it isn't his but I bet it is.

# Christmas is coming




