


The mayor likes us

'Let All Men Sing' Concert

Sunday afternoon, **March 26th, 2023** will be an historic day. The Choir set itself a target to have **100 male singers onstage** at some point during our Centenary Year.

And, fingers crossed, we are expecting to meet that goal at **Saint James's Church in Slaithwaite** at around **2.30 pm** when the concert is set to start.

For, appearing onstage will be our new 'Let All Men Sing' Community Choir, our wonderful Colne Valley Boys' Choir and the august men of Colne Valley Male Voice Choir itself. Together we should break the 100 mark with a few to spare!

But forget the head-count; consider the quality of the event. This will be a premiere and once-only performance by a group of men who have come together just to sing. Most of them have little prior experience of singing, but have been brought together to try out something new and to discover the bonds of friendship that communal musicmaking offers.

The word, after just a few of their eight sessions, is that they sound really good together.

They will be singing a couple of solo items.

Add to that there will be the Boys Choir, which our audience know to be charmingly proficient. The audience will also get to see the Colne Valley Male Voice Choir - radically - in 'smart casual ' clothing, singing a range of new and familiar tunes, including an 'Elvis' number.

And best off all - all three ensembles will sing together.

We'll all perform the rousing fanfare; 'Let All Men Sing' to start off what we hope will be a lively, friendly and informal occasion. And later we'll carouse through the rollicking and newly popular sea shanty, The Wellerman'.

And to conclude we'll share the emotional 'Let there be Peace on Earth' as our finale.

It'll be a great event, attracting a new - and probably full house audience at Saint James's and it'll only cost you a fiver, too. All proceeds will go to Men's Mental Health Charities. So you'll be helping out with a good cause, too. Why not be there?



Clarification: LAMS concert proceeds






Your Editor has made a bit of an error in the article above, when he reported - in the earlier online version - that 'All proceeds will go to Men's Mental Health Charities'. There was no intention to mislead readers but a couple of our organisers have been in touch with VotV concerned that my statement is not strictly accurate and might easily be misunderstood.

They are right ... but it depends, perhaps, on how you understand 'proceeds'...

Let me explain:- the Choir, itself a charity, has invested quite a lot of its funds to get the 'Let All Men Sing' project off the ground - marketing, staff, premises costs etc.

It was always intended that the income from ticket sales would go to recouping at least some of these costs. But, even with a good-sized audience and the raffle, the Choir has not been expecting there to be any surplus of income over expenditure.

That is why our organisers proposed a '**Bucket Collection**', geared to supporting men's mental health activities. The chosen charity is **ANDYSMANCLUB**, which seeks to help men cope with mental health issues and to promote men's mental wellbeing.



We did decide to price tickets at a very reasonable level (just £5.00 per ticket) in the hope that, if our audience enjoy their afternoon, they will be more kindly disposed to contributing generously to the 'ANDYSMANCLUB' collection.

Of course, the full amount of that 'collection will go to ANDYSMANCLUB. Your Editor hopes this clarification will reassure readers.

Spring Concert agreed

A joint concert with the Choir and the wonderful **Lindley Brass Band** was announced the other day.

Following discussions between the management teams of both organisations an agreement was reached to put on a concert together on April 30th - that's a Sunday afternoon - at 2:30 pm.

It will take place at **St John's in Golcar**. We know from previous concerts that St John's has a lovely acoustic for choral performance. And it'll be just £10.00 a ticket.

For many years, the choir performed with Lindley Band at the open-air 'Concert on the Hill' at Salendine Nook. We are pleased that our relationship is resuming.

And they'll bring with them another old friend of the Choir, who performed with us at many a Marsden Christmas concert.

That's **Alan Widdop**, once of Marsden Silver Prize Band and, since late 2022, conductor of Lindley.

We think it will be a lovely event with some super music.

LAMS visited by Radio Leeds

"It was all a bit hectic last night." reports Colne Valley Male Voice Choir's, **Kieran Chadha**.



"Abi Bliss from Radio Leeds came to visit the 'Let All Men Sing' rehearsal at the Slaithwaite Civic Hall.

She interviewed me, along with four of the singers. She was interested in the purpose of LAMS, why it was being run, what we were hoping to achieve.

Mostly we talked about the need for something like LAMS - to give men a go at singing, now that we're lacking the traditional musical experience people got from singing in school or church.

She asked about the choir's centenary, and my experience in the choir.



She wanted to know about my feelings on singing. I explained about it working as a mindfulness exercise - something to concentrate on, without being distracted by work or other stresses.

I added that the inter-generational opportunities are important to me - I value being able to spend time with people I wouldn't otherwise come into contact with. I also said the feeling of contributing to something is a big part of the satisfaction it delivers."

VotV readers should listen out for the broadcast. "Nothing is confirmed." said Kieran, "But we'll likely figure in a piece about four minutes long probably to be aired next Wednesday afternoon."


- is one of the most admired in all stage and film history. It is forever associated with the irrepressible Israeli actor **Chaim Topol**, who has died aged 87.

He played Tevye in the 1967 London premiere of '**Fiddler on the Roof**' and in the 1971 **Norman Jewison** film version.

She was the only one you'll remember in an otherwise totally forgettable film; '**One Million Years BC**'.

Of course hunting enough animal skins to provide sufficient warm clothing was quite a problem back in the 'Stone Age'.

LAMS Project put on 'repeat'.

We're only half way through our '**Let All Men Sing**' initiative to promote singing with men, who maybe have never tried choral singing and want to give it a try. But it's been so successful so far that that CVMVC has decided to do it again in 2024.

Baritone, **Kieran Chadha** told VotV: "We never expected to see close on forty men coming forward. We were really pleased that the plan had 'struck a chord' with the community and that interest was so high. We've only done a few sessions but the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive.

We had been compelled to close entry to the LAMS Choir, as we were in danger of having too many men to handle. But enquiries kept coming in from local men, who were disappointed that we had stopped enrolling. '**Please do it again', was the message**. So we've taken that request onboard and we've decided to run the scheme again in January next year.



That's not to say that any men who want to join **Colne Valley Male Voice Choir** won't still be welcome to come along to our Monday rehearsals and sing in with us until they feel confident enough to become members.

Our doors will remain open.


But for those many men who might want to explore singing without making a commitment, greater than to eight sessions and one informal concert, there will still be an option if they sign up for the January 2024 programme."


Simon in Venice
