

'Let All Men Sing' peaks with a great concert

LAMS - 'A community choir project for men that sing and men that would like to give it a try' - culminated last Sunday with a glorious one-off performance in Colne Valley Male Voice Choir's home village of Slaithwaite.

It was both joyful and deeply moving. A group of men, who had put in just eight rehearsals, having come together from scratch, sang with both vigour and subtlety to their delighted friends and family in a packed Saint James's Church in the heart of the village.

Many of the 'LAMS' men were nervous, having never got up onstage before but if they were, it didn't show. Maybe this was because the first number was performed jointly with the men of the Colne Valley Male Voice Choir. This was the rousing fanfare - the song which had given our project its name - 'Let All Men Sing' by Keith Christopher.



VotV is fortunate that its reporter, **Chris Wilson**, recorded this performance, so you can watch again the big start to the concert, which 'wowed' our new audience and gave all the singers confidence to 'smash it' through the rest of the show.

others making enquiries but we felt it was right to close the list soon after start-up. But the strong interest has helped us decide to run the project

again early in 2024 - so don't be shy about coming forward. You can register an interest now.)

Not only did he conduct all the performances by the LAMS choir, Colne Valley Boys and CVMVC - singing as individual groups and in every combination - but he also compèred the programme, most genially setting the tone for a audience that maybe didn't always know what to expect.

He made everyone feel at home and left all of us, singers and concert-goers alike, feeling they were part of a great occasion.

He explained how the LAMs Choir had come together and how thrilled he was that they and the rest of the team - men & boys - had come together to enjoy making music.

"I strongly support Norman Jacobs letter demanding the BBC does not disband the BBC Singers – as do (at least) 144,000 licence-payers, who signed a petition 700 composers, 150 Musical Directors of cathedral, collegiate and university choirs, most chamber choirs, 22 former BBC Young Musicians, and amateur choirs from all over the country. If this isn't proof of 'audience needs', I don't know what is.

As for the 'need to modernise' the BBC singers perform more new music than any other choral group. How musically qualified are these faceless BBC managers to make this appalling decision against overwhelming expert opposition?"

Morecambe Winter Gardens

A seaside theatre - Morecambe Winter Gardens - has been in the news recently. That's because this fine old concert room, once known as the **Albert Hall of the North** is set for a remarkable restoration.



Once one of the country's most popular theatres, drawing tourists from across the UK, it has been awarded a grant of £2.78 million from the Cultural Development Fund to help it, once again, be one of the best music venues in the North of England.






First opened in 1897, the theatre was one of the largest in the North West of England.

With lavish interiors and striking architectural features, it quickly became the heart of a thriving seaside resort and played host to some of the most famous stars of music and variety culture.

However, like Morecambe, it fell on hard times. But fortunately, a group of dedicated volunteers formed the Preservation Trust in 2006. They have pledged to restore it and, soon, they hope the theatre will, once again, be at the heart of the region's entertainment, culture and economy.

Why does this Winter Gardens news figure in VotV?



Well, for many years the Winter gardens hosted a prestigious Music Festival. When one of its adjudicators, WG McNaught wrote to **Sir Edward Elgar** inviting him to attend and consider composing a piece for the competition, he was able to promise 3,000 competitors and a hall with a 5,000 capacity.

There was a whole week including speech, drama and dance as well as instrumental classes and singing for children and adults.

But maybe the biggest feature in its heyday was a choral competition for the **Festival Rose Bowl**. This was very keenly contested. Choirs competed regularly from all across the North West, together with choirs, that travelled from further afield. Partly it was the lure of competition and partly it provided choirs with a trip to the seaside.

Amongst those that joined the contest was Colne Valley Male Voice Choir.

Our Choir - which in the 1930's already had a national reputation for excellence - entered the Winter Gardens choral contest twice.

We competed for the coveted Rose Bowl trophy in 1935 and came second. In 1938, we entered again. And again we didn't secure the Rose Bowl – close, but once more in Silver Medal position.

I think this must have grated, as we had won the even more prestigious 'Blackpool Music Festival' competition in 1936 and 1937 and won it again in 1938. We didn't compete again in Morecambe. World War II broke out in 1939 and everything changed.

Some of the 1938 Blackpool victors happy to have restored their top-rank status, after a second place in the Winter Gardens Music Festival in Morecambe.
