

A wonderful blend of tradition and new beginnings

It all began with a young boy singing, alone, the first verse of 'Once In royal David's City'. The treble voice, beautifully tuneful, belonged to Leo Gomersal, a Marsden lad. Leo had only joined Colne Valley Boys in September so he was making his Town Hall debut.

The rest of the Boys joined in, then the full Colne Valley Male Voice Choir, the wonderful Brighouse and Rastrick Band and the audience, too. Then the choirs went straight into a jaunty Christmas song, 'We Need a Little Christmas' and the 2023 Huddersfield Town Hall Christmas Concert was off to a great start.





Our new compère, **Andrew Edwards**, welcomed everyone and began his excellently structured commentary to the evening as he introduced the forthcoming numbers. Andrew, with his broadcasting background, brought a new warmth and clarity in this his first compèring role with the Choir - a task that was well done by his predecessor **Dr. Simon Lindley** with his wit and deep musical knowledge. (Simon was up in the 'Royal Box' with our VIPs.)

The Choir continued with an excellent new piece, 'Jubilate, Exultate' and then added a lively clapping rhythm to further enliven a jolly 'Nowell for the Merrie Citie'.

There were 67 singers onstage plus about 20 'Boys'. Well over a dozen of the men were new members, recruited during the last year after the Choir's phenomenally successful community-based singing initiative, 'Let All Men Sing'.






If they - and some of the 'old hands', too - were slightly nervous before the performance, by the time 'Jubilate' came up they were just revelling in the joy of performance and singing with skill and gusto under the clear guidance from our very esteemed Musical Director, **Thom Meredith**.

And it was Thom conducting the magnificent **Dan Forrest** version of the old hymn, '**Great is Thy Faithfulness**'. He stationed a fanfare of six brass players high up behind the Choir and arranged that the Father Willis organ, in the hands of super-talented young organist, **Caius Lee** should accompany.



Starting with an earthy low organ rumble and then with the rousing fanfare both boys' and men's choirs joined in with a unison melody. The sound was magnificent as each element moved into harmonies and built towards a great climax, which rattled the Town Hall's splendid architecture. The Choir loved it and so did the audience



In the second half the music continued to entertain. Second tenor, **Tom Law**, distinguished with a fabulous solo to '**In the Bleak Midwinter**'. This was a challenging arrangement by **Michael Betteridge**, an up and coming choral conductor - and soon to be Marsden resident - who has taken rehearsals with Colne Valley as a very welcome 'Guest Conductor' this year.





By audience reaction, perhaps the highlight of the Band's contributions was a delightfully comic version of the Disney, 'Jungle Book' number, 'The Bare Necessities'

This featured E flat bass (and sousaphone) player **Dan Hebb**.

The concert came to an end, once again with Thom leading the Choir, The full band, the organ and even a piano duet, involving bass, **Benjamin Stubbs** alongside our esteemed accompanist, Chris Pulleyn, in another Dan Forrest re-arrangement, this time of that all-time favourite carol, 'Hark the Herald Angels Sing'. Wonderful.

The audience - which incidentally pretty well filled the Town Hall - were enthusiastically warm in their applause and went home - no doubt - with the sense that Christmas had well and truly begun.


So VotV grabbed a handful of the 'New Boys' for a photo and a comment on their first performance.



They picked numbers that got people into foot-tapping and celebratory mood.






The Choir's items complemented the band's choices. Together, an atmosphere of pre-Christmas enjoyment and goodwill was generated.

So when the audience was invited to join the band - by now in Santa Claus hats - in singing the 'Twelve Days of Christmas' everybody was having a fine time.




It was a lovely event to be part of - an annual event the Colne Valley can be proud of; one that never fails to delight.

100 years ago: new choir decides to pack it in

Just about 8 months after being set up, Colne Valley Male Voice Choir, came close to giving up.

On Monday January 1st 1923, at the first annual meeting, the Choir considered a proposal to disband and it seemed there was a majority in favour. (It's anybody's guess what triggered the proposal to close down; quite possibly that choir numbers weren't great.)

However, at the last minute, someone proposed that a final decision to close down should be deferred until the Choir had done three concert performances, which were already booked in the Choir's Engagements Diary. Sufficient votes were cast by Choir members for that amendment to pass - so an immediate shut-down was put off.

'No, let's carry on' - the Choir never looks back.

After this delay - and we might suppose - three successful concerts - there was a change of heart and the Choir resolved to continue. Under a new Chairman, **Clarence Roberts**, the Choir once again tried its skills in concerts and competitions.



On July 7th 2023, the Choir won its highest prize - second place - at the Thornhill Festival and then the following Saturday the Choir won 'First Prize' for the first time at Batley.

Since then we've averaged one 'First Prize' in competitions every year for the last 100 years.

This is Chairman Roberts seen many, many years later with some more trophies.

Meanwhile in other news...

spectators enough to allow Bolton Wanderers to win the FA Cup.




And the **Flying Scotsman** goes into service. This is him coming in to the Colne Valley recently.

After singing in the centenary concert with all the LAMS men, the Choir and Colne Valley Boys, too, I was certainly eager to join the main choir and build upon what we had learnt.

I thoroughly enjoy being part of something bigger and love to be involved, giving 100% in all that I do.

When the opportunity came to be more involved and take over the 200 Club I was more than happy to oblige and get to know more members. I look forward to spending many happy years with the choir in the coming future."

Sadly, veteran baritone, John Radcliffe won't see another Christmas. Or, maybe, he will as part of the 'Choir Eternal'.

John died the night of the concert. We knew his health wasn't good but I'm told he was out and about earlier in the week. So at least the illness that took him to Calderdale Infirmary was brief.

John had stopped singing with the Choir a couple of years ago but was regularly seen by old friends at Choir events.

Few members will match John's years of membership.

He joined In 1957 at the age of 18 yrs and sung with us for well over 60 years before becoming a non-singing member.

Here we see him pouring the wine on a Choir tour to France in 1975.

John was the Choir's Librarian for 17 years but was perhaps best known as the Choir's 'Padre', always called on to say a few words at times of celebration and grief.



Better still, he was a lovely chap. He will be missed.

The Funeral Service will be held at 11.30 am on Friday 5th January at St Bartholomew's Church Meltham. It will be followed by a private cremation.

Family flowers only, reports secretary, Jenny Baxter, but donations in lieu will be shared between CVMVC and The Crossroads Centre, Meltham. The Choir, as always for departed members, sang the 'Fourfold Amen' in his memory. At the funeral Jenny expects that, particularly the older members, will want to turn out in numbers and join in the hymns. It may be that we sing, 'The Irish Blessing'

Practice makes perfect



It turns out that it's not just male voice choir singers who need to practise. It seems birds do, too.

Recent research, reported in BBC wildlife magazine, tells us that robins and blackbirds need to rehearse regularly in the autumn and winter months in order to be performance-ready for the Spring, when the quality of their singing makes all the difference if they are to be successful.

It seems even in the egg and as newly-hatched in the nest, that baby birds listen to their parents singing. Then, as young birds, they practice using their own voices, learning how to sing. And, in the months before their first breeding attempts, the youngsters repeat and refine what naturalists call 'sub-song' in preparation for their adult singing they'll use to attract a mate. With each rehearsal they become more assured in their material and more persuasive to their listeners.



I can't be entirely certain that Colne Valley men use the similar techniques to melt the hearts of their lovers but it wouldn't surprise me. It's certainly the case that the more confident we singers sound, the more impressed our audiences are.


So keep practising, gents!


