


'North and South' Concert

Second tenor David was in Mousehole on Saturday wondering where we are all were.....





Well, we were up in West Yorkshire; two fabulous choirs coming together: Mousehole Male Voice Choir from Cornwall at the climax of its Northern Tour joined up with Colne Valley men in Golcar for what was rightly dubbed by a respected musician and critic: "A glorious celebration of male voice singing."

It was a wet autumn night, the rain bucketing down but that didn't prevent the fine old church in **Golcar** being packed. The Mousehole Choir about fifty strong had brought a coach-load of supporters with them and CVMVC - a little bigger - had sold so many tickets there was genuine concern that we were running up against fire-safety limits and might have to turn people away. Fortunately the storms kept a few people at home, so we just about managed to accommodate everybody.

The Colne Valley men as always under Thom Meredith's leadership started the concert off. Thom began with Vaughan Williams **Antiphon**, which VotV is reminded was what won us the '**Best UK Choir**' title at the Cornwall International Male Voice Choir Festival (for the 3rd time) a few years back. Well, with **Chris Pulleyn**'s mighty piano accompaniment, we did it brilliantly on Saturday night. It set the standard for a wonderful night of singing.





Then in a triumph of stage done, management (well Robert choir al) one swapped for another and auided principal by their conductor, Steve Lawry, the Mousehole men delivered the first of their two sets, skilled, powerful and entertaining. Crammed in at the back, we Colne Valley singers listened admiringly to the variety and quality of their performance (a personal highlight - their 'Ghost Riders in the Sky' was a brilliant choice).

Then each of the two choirs gave a second set of 4 pieces; our audience increasingly enthusiastic before we reached the concert's finale. Somehow we managed to get both choirs onstage together for two joint items.

Thom conducted the rousing item; 'We Rise Again' coaxing a performance that demonstrated both subtlety and beauty on the one hand and great power on the other.

Then Thom gave way to Steve for that absolute male voice choir classic, 'Morte Christe'. So tender and haunting in parts, so dramatically huge at its peak, Steve led both choirs, in an unusually slower tempo, to a majestic climax that brought our audience to its feet in fervent applause and appreciation.



"Wow wow! What a fantastic night I'm surprised you didn't blow the roof off!" said a less restrained commentator - and she was right too!

Mousehole Chairman, **Brett Farmer**, offered an elegant thanks to CVMVC for the invite and presented us with a silver tray. Colne Valley Chair, **Kieran Chadha** gave a equally elegant reply thanking Mousehole people for coming and for the wonderful evening we had jointly created and then the singers and their supporters went out into the rain to **Bolster Moor Farm Shop.**

The good folk at the Farm Shop - themselves great supporters of the Choir - had laid on a 'Pie and Pea' supper for our guests - not to mention some fine cask beer from the local Empire Brewery. A big thank you to **Matt** and **Linda** and the other CV helpers.



There followed a very pleasant evening with some 'Ale Voice Choir' singing.



You can spot **Roger Fielding** joining in the singing in the picture below. He it was who, from the CVMVC end of things, worked relentlessly to ensure the Mousehole visit happened at all and better still turned out to be a huge success - **Well Done**, **Roger**.

Mrs Sunderland workshop

Our Friends at the Mrs Sunderland Music festival have been in touch to tell us about the opening event in the 2026 Festival. The Choir won't be in the competition next year but members and readers might like to join in the brilliant workshop and concert event on the Sunday February 1st.



"Dear friends,

The Huddersfield Mrs Sunderland Performing Arts Festival is one of the largest in the country and welcomes more than 5,000 performers over an 11 day period.

The opening event is the Adult Vocal Workshop and Concert, held at Huddersfield Town Hall on the first Sunday in February before the main festival starts. I hope you can share the information about the workshop with any singers who may be interested in taking part. The theme for 2026 is Stage and Screen and all the information needed to enter is available from the Mrs Sunderland 2026 website.

The workshop and concert will feature well-known songs and instrumental music composed for the theatre or cinema and classical pieces used in film scores. The workshop will be led by **Thom Meredith**, accompanied by **Christopher Pulleyn** (piano) and the Musica Youth Orchestra, conductor Nick Dolling. Two talented young local singers, Aurelia Grundy and **Damien Stirling**, will also perform a number of solos and duets.

The programme for the choir features:

West Side Story Medley Bernstein (arr. Thomas)

O Fortuna (Carmina Burana) Orff

Lacrimosa (Requiem) Mozart

Hymn to the fallen John Williams

Workshop: Sunday 1 February 2026 9-00 am to 4-45 pm

Concert: 5-45 pm to 7-00 pm

Workshop entry: £30 (£20 students)

Concert Tickets: Adults £10 Under18s free (with ticket) available from the Kirklees Box Office.

Music will be issued on the day of the workshop though singers are welcome to use their own copies if preferred. There are numerous performances of all the pieces on YouTube and Spotify.



Getting Christmas Concert tickets in the old days

Not only is it a fabulous concert. It's arguably been the best in the district for over half a century. We usually book the best brass band in the world and this year, once again, it will be - Brighouse and Rastrick Brass Band - and it will be a wonderful event.

It's also a pivotal event for the Choir and very important for the Choir's financial stability - so we put in lots of effort to ensure we sell lots of tickets - especially after the only slowly disappearing effects of the Covid Pandemic that hit all audience numbers at cultural events. Last year we pretty-well filled the Town Hall - this year we don't want even a few empty seats. A full house enriches the experience, turns a good concert into a very special experience.

50 years ago

It was all very different 50 years ago. Walter Smith (see article above) recalls the way it was done in 1975. He tells VotV that the Choir would start by placing an advert in the 'small adds' columns of all the local papers, inviting people to come and get tickets, announcing that they would be available from 7.30 in the morning in the Mayor's Parlour at the Town Hall



...."When we arrived around half an hour before sale time, there was usually a long queue about four deep already waiting.

We arranged tables and set up a production line starting with taking orders. These were then checked to make sure they were as requested, then priced, which was

also checked. After paying the Treasurer, the tickets received one final check before being handed to the

customer.

Within a couple of hours we had sold out and I was on the way to deposit the cash in the Bank Night Safe. I worked at the Slaithwaite Branch of the Bank, (Now Rumpus) so it was easy for me to collect the Night Safe Wallets from Huddersfield Branch on Friday for use on Saturday.

Puts me in mind, muses your Editor, of tickets for Taylor Swift's Era Tour or the Oasis Revival selling out online in minutes.

Whatever the method, Christmas Concert tickets are going fast so - no FOMO - don't hang about, get yours secured without delay!

A performance not to be missed



Vocal coach gets to work

Always striving for improvement the Choir has recently been fortunate to have secured the services of renowned singer and vocal coach, **Rhianydd Beaumont**. For an initial six months, Rhianydd will be visiting our Monday rehearsals and take individual Choir singers out for brief one-to-one coaching sessions, listening to singers, giving practical guidance and providing vocal practice exercises both in the session and for ongoing practice - all about helping singers to get the most from our voices. So far she's taken about a dozen off us and she'll be a regular visitor, so gradually every singer will get a chance to benefit.

Some singers have been a bit nervous beforehand but when they emerge they are generally buzzing with enthusiasm.

One of the first to get a session...

'As a new Choir member (writes second tenor, Andrew Taylor) and one less familiar with choral singing one of the aspects I have found most difficult to master is how to sing without becoming exhausted! Rhianydd's advice on posture (apparently I tend to 'stand to attention'), the importance of relaxing even whilst belting it out, and breathing properly was really helpful. In fact, so much so, I've booked another session! One unkind Choir member commented, 'One won't be enough'.



About our new vocal coach....

Rhianydd Beaumont studied at Bretton Hall in Wakefield before joining the national touring production of 'The Phantom of the Opera.' After this she went to Berlin, Germany where she joined the cast of Disney's original production of 'The Hunchback of Notre Dame' (Der Glöckner Von Notre Dame) as a swing, performing 9 roles in German. Rhianydd then joined the UK national touring production of Disney's 'Beauty and the Beast,' where she played Belle.



Rhianydd has also performed with Opera North (West End Production of Carousel), National/European tour of 'The Sopranos', Gilbert and Sullivan Opera Company National Tour and in The Thursford Christmas Spectacular. As a soloist Rhianydd's recent performances have been Handel's Messiah, Mozart's Exsultate Jubilate, Bach's Cantata 147 and Bach's St John's Passion.

Rhianydd has been a singing teacher for over 20 years and considers teaching her students as rewarding as performing itself. She teaches students from 7+ to adult. She also takes workshops with groups and individuals, recently taking a group of 500 children for a sign and sing workshop in the Huddersfield Town Hall for the Mrs Sunderland Performing Arts Festival.

Rhianydd coaches voice at several musical theatre schools locally and also at Huddersfield New College. She has recently worked in Calderdale's Voice Clinic with the leading ENT and SLT specialists as a vocal consultant.
