Hi Mr Editor,

Many thanks for welcoming me to the Choir. I am absolutely delighted to have become part of it!

I've always loved choral music and, at times, wanted to join a choir, but my frequent long absences from home as a merchant seafarer precluded any meaningful commitment to an established group. However, I am retired now and can do so!

Some weeks ago I saw the sign above the door of the Conservative Club in Slaithwaite for CVMVC and its message for new membership and, after some enquiry, contacted Kieran Chadha and learned of your new location in Linthwaite.

I did have misgivings about my capabilities, especially after attending the concert at St James' Golcar with Mousehole MVC, as the level of singing was truly wonderful. But with some encouragement from my wife, Karen, I decided to 'take the plunge'.

My background, as I mentioned, is in the Merchant Navy. I worked for many years as technical crew member on multipurpose oceanographic research vessels.



From a musical standpoint, I was in a church choir as a boy, but I have had no training worthy of note; indeed, any singing came mostly from frequent shipboard singing sessions which my colleagues and I loved. (These sessions were often rather raucous, but great fun nevertheless!).

David Hirst, fount of all Choir knowledge, corrects VotV

The longest-serving member in the Choir's glorious history - just over 65 years as a singer with us, famed baritone, and keeper of a database of all Choir engagements has been in touch with your Editor with information about the last edition regarding a new relationship with **Yorkshire Imperial Brass Band** and a forthcoming joint concert in the prestigious **St. George's Hall** in Bradford. We'll be performing with them on **Saturday, June 6**th **2026**.





VotV told its readers this will be the first time the Choir has teamed up with **Yorkshire Imperial** and the first time we've performed in **St Georges Hall** for over 50 years.

Well, David comes up with the facts:-

'Yorkshire Imperial Metals Band, as it was once called, and Colne Valley Male Voice Choir performed together last at Dewsbury Town Hall on December 17th 1995. This was the second of two Christmas collaborations that year. We also gave a concert on the 1st December in Morley Town Hall.'



David didn't give chapter and verse but it seems we've appeared together on 8-10 previous occasions. So VotV was not right at all - but it is 30 years since we last played together.

'As for performing at St Georges Hall, we joined **James Shepherd Versatile Brass** in a concert there in April 1979 and a few years earlier
(in 1970) we sang in St Georges Hall, having teamed up with the
venerable **Hammonds Sauce Band**.'

VotV is happy to set the record straight.

Choirmen celebrate 250 years of trains - what?



'Men have adored steam locomotives for about 250 years' said VotV.

Well, various readers have said - 'What bunkum. You got it all wrong with your 250 years nonsense. The first railway was the 1825 Stockton and Darlington - 200 years ago. That's what we've all been celebrating.'



Well up to a point ...

England had numerous early, isolated, wooden-railed tramways, called wagonways, which were used for transporting heavy goods like coal and were typically horse-drawn. These railways had been going for years before the first public, steam-powered railway in 1825.

And steam engines were nothing new. In 1775, the partnership between **James Watt** and **Matthew Boulton** led to the development and commercialization of **Watt's Improved Steam Engine** design. This is considered a key event in the Industrial Revolution. Their first commercial engines were built to provide power for collieries and ironworks. But steam engines had been built and functioning from much earlier - eg the **Newcomen** engines of 1712. These engines, of course, were stationary but many experiments were being made to put them on wheels. Perhaps



the first really successful was **Richard Trevithick's** full-scale working locomotive, the **Penydarren Locomotive**, which made the world's first railway journey on February 21, 1804, in South Wales. It successfully hauled ten tons of iron and 70 men over 9 miles from the Penydarren Ironworks to the Merthyr-Cardiff Canal.

Our friend in the Choir, John Smith - RIP

Any singer who's been in the Choir for a few years - and anyone who's been a regular part of our audience for the last few decades - will be saddened to hear of the death of one of our most enthusiastic singers, second-tenor and all-round good guy, John Smith. (often known as Jack).

John, who has been very frail for some time, passed away peacefully in his care home in Dalton last Wednesday, well into his 94th year.

Awarded Honorary Life Membership, Jack went on singing with us for over 47 years before his last concert in Golcar in April 2022 – the Celebration Concert for our retiring accompanist, Maestro Keith Swallow - Jack didn't want to miss that!



Jack saw army service in Egypt, was a bus driver and, latterly, an ambulance driver. If you went anywhere in Kirklees, he'd know the route and would probably tell you some gory story about a terrible accident he got called to deal with - but generally with a smile and a joke to follow.

John was with us when we first travelled to the Cornwall International Male Voice Choir Festival.

We see him here with his brother, Melvyn and the cups we won.

And again, he was in the thick of things when we won the 'Overall Best UK Choir' title again at Cornwall in 2015.







John leaves an extensive family to remember him.

His son, Andy, tells VotV how important music and CVMVC was to John and he invites as many Choir friends as can make it, to the service on Wednesday 17th December at 10.30 at Huddersfield Crematorium. And afterwards at the Roundhill Inn at Rastrick where everyone is welcome.


