Usually we have one of the world's best brass bands as our guest and this year was no exception - once again we welcomed the **Brighouse and Rastrick Band** and it was generally acknowledged - by our audience, packed into apparently every single seat in the Area and Balcony - to be totally brilliant.

And the Choir was great, too. In fact everything about the evening was magnificent; the auditorium, beautifully decorated and lit, the compère, **Andrew Edwards**, illustrating the programme content with carefully-chosen snippets of information, the wonderful **Father Willis Organ** that introduced the concert and occasionally accompanied Band and Choir pieces everything contributed to a glorious experience.

Then a blue and dim winter light rose on part of the Choir picking out one singer in particular, **Matt Houston**.





Matt began to sing - ever so beautifully - the opening verse of that most-loved of Carols, 'Silent Night, Holy Night'. After a while the Choir joined in, in support

This was the version of 'Silent Night' arranged by one of the Choir's favourite contemporary composers, **Dan Forrest**.

The song developed - clearly our familiar carol - but now it came with variations of melody and rhythm, building towards a crescendo (the stage lights brightened too, in step with the volume).

And then the volume (and the lighting) faded to pianissimo until all that remained was Chris's accompaniment which diminished to a final haunting single note and darkness. The auditorium was entranced. Then after a brief moment of profound silence in the hall, there was an eruption of applause and the house lights returned.

Well done to the Lighting Technician in the gallery, to Thom Meredith for master-minding the drama, to Matt for taking the solo role so poignantly and, above all, to Chris for bringing out the music so magically.



It was a stunning start to a wonderful concert and everyone present was now in a mood to appreciate and enjoy the musical treats to come.

Edwin - soon to be a graduate of Greenhead College - is a young man with a great future. He currently plays the organ at Halifax Minster, studying under that legendary organist, Darius Bhattiwala. Soon he will continue studies at Hereford Cathedral and has already secured a place as Organ Scholar at Queen's College, Cambridge for 2027.

That's a prodigious CV for one so young. He certainly was a great asset to Sunday's concert, playing welcome carols to the incoming audience and then expertly backing several pieces by Choir and band.
